Members June 3, 2021 Virtual Meeting

We will have a virtual Zoom Meeting on June 3, 2021 at 7 p.m., when writer and environmental consultant Rick Radis will present "Return of the Raven". The presentation will cover the historic status of the Common Raven in eastern North America from the late 1880s, its remarkable return in the 1990s, and its present status as a nesting species in many (often surprising) areas of NJ and the eastern states.

Rick is an editor, writer and environmental consultant who has worked on land and water preservation and as an endangered species specialist since the late 1970s. He is a past editor of NJ Birds, NJ Audubon Magazine, and other conservation publications. The program promises to be entertaining as well as educational. Join us for this Zoom meeting.



Bird Brains, Revealed; A new Sibley books looks at life through the eyes of a Bird

David Allen Sibley's new book, *What It's Like to Be a Bird*, is full of intriguing details: birds bob their heads when they walk to stabilize their vision; they have a



brilliant sense of balance; and some can even sense magnetic fields to help with long-distance navigation. Across nearly 200 pages, Sibley diverges from his famous birding guidebooks to give readers a sense of how birds really work—and to develop a deeper

understanding of the world we share with them.

"One of the themes that impressed me throughout my work on this book is that a bird's experience is far richer, more complex, and more 'thoughtful' than I'd imagined," writes Sibley. Crows, for example, can recognize human faces and convey to other birds whether a person is dangerous.

Sibley also sets the record straight on a few common myths about birds. "Eating like a bird," it turns out, is not at all like picking at a salad. Birds eat some 10% of their body weight every day. If a person were to do the same, it would mean putting away 25 pizza a day.

There are several programs on You Tube with Sibley talking about his book, and I highly recommend if you have a free hour to check one out. Highly informative and interesting. Also, you can purchase the book and enjoy it year-round.
