2022 Tuckerton Christmas Bird Count

First Report: All of the reports are now in and I have done the official tally. Just as a reference, our best ever species total since Southern Ocean Birding Group revitalized the Tuckerton count in 2010 was during the 2020 CBC with 96 species. This year we topped that with 97 species. What a great job everyone did! We are inching closer to that elusive 100 species count. Josh Gant did some additional birding yesterday and found 5 species we didn't see on Saturday. We can't add them to our total, but they do get reported as extra data into the CBC database (Thanks Josh!) It also tells me that we left some meat on the bone and getting a Tuckerton species count of over 100 species is definitely possible.

Final Report: The Tuckerton count data has been finalized, and a bow has been tied on this year's Christmas Bird Count. The only change from past communications was with our total species count - one of our hawk species was disallowed on lack of compelling evidence, so our total species is now 96 this year - tied with our best ever.

Thanks go to Greg as always for adding context to the raw data we produce; reading his narrative is really one of the highlights of doing the count for me. SOBG members will also see something on the count in one of the next newsletters.

With that it will be "radio silence" from me until November when I will start the call for the 124th annual count.

First Field Trip for 2023

The first field trip of the new year was held on January 21, 2023, with 16 members braving the cold winds at Forsythe National Wildlife Refuge. Josh Gant and Jason Nargiz served as our guides as we caravanned around the Wildlife Drive.

Our first stop started with a bang at Gull Tower and the drive there: Red-shouldered Hawk sitting in a tree just hanging out, Tundra Swans and Pintails, Bald Eagles flying over, Long-billed Dowitchers, Coot, and Greater Yellowlegs just at the start.



Continuing along the drive, more waterfowl gave us good views as the wind started to really blow.

Green-winged Teal, Northern Shovelers, Gadwalls, American Wigeon, Mallards and Black Ducks, all three Mergansers, and about 3500 Snow Geese gave all a thrill. Northern Harriers were abundant along with a Gray Ghost who flew along side the drive.



Heading along the east dike, a immature Bald Eagle was giving the Osprey platform a once over, trying to maintain some dignity in the gusting winds and provided great photo ops.



Once we hit the dogleg, no Short-eared owls were present, but sharp-eyed Josh found a small flock of sparrows, including Song, Savannah, and Tree sparrows in the blowing grasses. Trying to find them was like a "Where's Waldo" exercise. But everyone seemed to have gotten glass on them.

At the Forsythe Overlook, more sparrows were flying around, completing our day. All in all 55 species were found, very successful trip!!
