The meeting is at Wells Mills County Park, Wells Mills Road, Waretown, starting at 7 p.m., but doors open at 6:30.





Birdy Bits News:

Birdcast.Info is a website by The Cornell Lab and partners that provides a tool for up-to-date information on migration throughout the U.S. When, where, and how far will birds migrate? How many birds passed last night? Their tools help you explore the answers to these and many other questions about bird migration. The dashboard can give you how many birds passed through your state the night before and bird migration forecast maps show predicted nocturnal migration 3 hours after local sunset and are updated every 6 hours. Colorado State University and the Cornell Lab of Ornithology currently produce these forecasts.



For example, last night May 25-26, over 360,000 birds flew over New Jersey, with 229,000 of those flying over Ocean County. It can give you the peak hours, the direction, and altitude of the flights, along with expected nocturnal species flying that night. Great source of information for birders. Live data feeds begin each night after sunset. Check it out.
